The Narrative

Alexander Hamilton AH's disadvantaged youth, hard work, determination, hurricane report, first job, NY. AH seeks advice from Burr, expresses desire for war, talk about imminent revolution AH expresses determination to and inspires others to "not throw away their shots." All agree, over several rounds, to risk their lives in the coming war Schuyler sisters enjoy NY atmosphere of coming war, lots of men. Angelica rejects Burr. Farmer Refuted - Seabury takes stand against revolution and AH rebukes him King George predicts revolution failure. Promises to kill patriots to show his love. Washington losing war and needs help. Rejects Burr and hires AH. Burr jealous of AH but says they agree on ladies. Both interested in Schuyler sisters. Eliza falls for Hamilton; jealous of sister Angelica who has eyes for him. AH and Eliza wed; Angelica settles for second best but not satisfied. In round of drinks, congratulations; Burr reveals affair with Theodosia. Burr still resents Hamilton's success but will wait for his own success. Losing war; AH wants a command; Washington changing tactics; French to send help Pros, cons, and process of dueling Washington reprimands Hamilton for duel and sends him home. Eliza begs Hamilton to just be satisfied and stay alive for her and their children. Lafayette joins war bringing guns and ships and gets Hamilton back in action Washington and Hamilton talk and declare eves are now going to be on Hamilton Strategy, execution, and victory at the Battle of Yorktown Laurens killed in fight with British in SC. King George taunts: How what are you going to do? Burr and Hamilton make promises to daughter Theodosia and son Phillip respectively. Burr and Hamilton back in NY competing, Hamilton winning, Burr complaining What'd I Miss Jefferson returns from Paris to be Secy. Of State; Hamilton Secy. of Treasury Hamilton vs. Jefferson and Madison on assumption of state debts. Hamilton skips break with family in upstate NY. Too much to do. Alone in NY, Hamilton begins affair with Maria Reynolds (1791) Hamilton gets debt assumption while Jefferson and Madison get southern capitol. Burr elected NY Senator French and English at war. US to remain neutral, AH's position. Jefferson, Burr, and Madison conspire against Hamilton Jefferson and Washington resigning; Hamilton to help Washington with final speech. King George scorns John Adams as possible replacement for Washington. Adams and Hamilton fight and Hamilton is fired. Jefferson, Burr, Madison accuse Hamilton of embezzling. Hamilton remembers always writing his way out of trouble and decides to do it again. Hamilton confesses adultery, destroying personal, protecting professional reputation. Eliza reacts to the Reynolds Pamphlet with denial Angelica rebukes Hamilton, pledges loyalty to Eliza. Hamilton's son defends his father, dies in duel with Eacker. Hamilton and Eliza say goodbye to Phillip Hamilton suffers depression after death of Phillip; Eliza forgives him. Jefferson vs. Burr. Hamilton supports Jefferson who wins. End of Burr career. Burr angry with Hamilton. Challenges him. Hamilton accepts. Hamilton rises early for duel, makes excuses, and says goodbye to Eliza Burr kills Hamilton in duel, expresses mild regret because his reputation is ruined. Who Lives, Dies, Tells Story Hamilton's story told; Eliza's fifty years after Hamilton's death.
